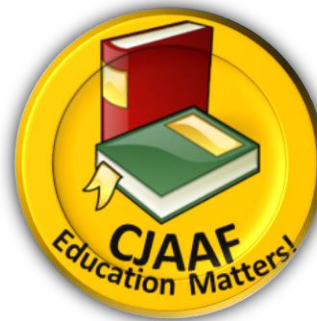

BROWARD MEAT & FISH MARKS OVER A DECADE OF EMPOWERING YOUNG WOMEN THROUGH SCHOLARSHIPS

There is something deeply meaningful about watching a community come together to invest in the dreams of its young people. For a decade, Broward Meat & Fish has done just that—quietly and consistently supporting the Jamaican Women of Florida Scholarship Program (JWOF) and, in the process, helping to shape the futures of countless young women.

Through this enduring partnership, doors have been opened for students to pursue higher education across the country, stepping into fields as diverse as science, medicine, law, education, and the arts. Each scholarship tells a story—not just of academic achievement, but of resilience, hope, and the power of being seen and supported.

This year, that story continues with two remarkable young women: Abigail Jacquette and Kylin Reynolds. Each was awarded a \$5,000 scholarship, bringing Broward Meat & Fish’s total contribution to \$70,000 over the years. Their achievements were celebrated at the JWOF Scholarship Luncheon on March 28 at the Diplomat Beach Resort in Fort Lauderdale, where family, supporters, and members gathered to honor their journeys.

Abigail Jacquette, a senior at Coral Reef Senior High School in Miami, is preparing to attend the University of South Florida this fall. She will major in Health Sciences with a concentration in Healthcare Administration on the pre-medical track. Already, Abigail has shown remarkable dedication—earning her Associate of Arts degree from Miami Dade College through dual enrollment, a milestone that speaks to both her discipline and her quiet determination.

Kylin Reynolds, a senior at North Broward Preparatory School and an International Baccalaureate Diploma candidate, is guided by both passion and purpose. She is currently deciding between attending the University of Florida and Emory University this fall. Kylin plans to major in Environmental Science with a minor in Marine Ecology, reflecting her deep commitment to sustainability and the natural world. With a love for both environmental studies and dance, she envisions a future where science and the arts intersect—using creativity to inspire awareness and meaningful change.

In a message that felt as personal as it was inspiring, Broward Meat & Fish owners Denise Lujo and Ruben Lujo shared their pride:

“Your achievement is a testament to your hard work, determination, and the bright promise you carry into the future. This scholarship is more than financial support—it is a recognition of your potential and a celebration of the goals you are pursuing. We believe in your journey and are inspired by your ambition.”

They offered a simple but powerful reminder—one that resonates far beyond this moment—that while education opens doors, it is passion that gives life meaning, and heritage that grounds us in who we are.

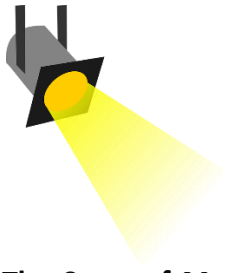

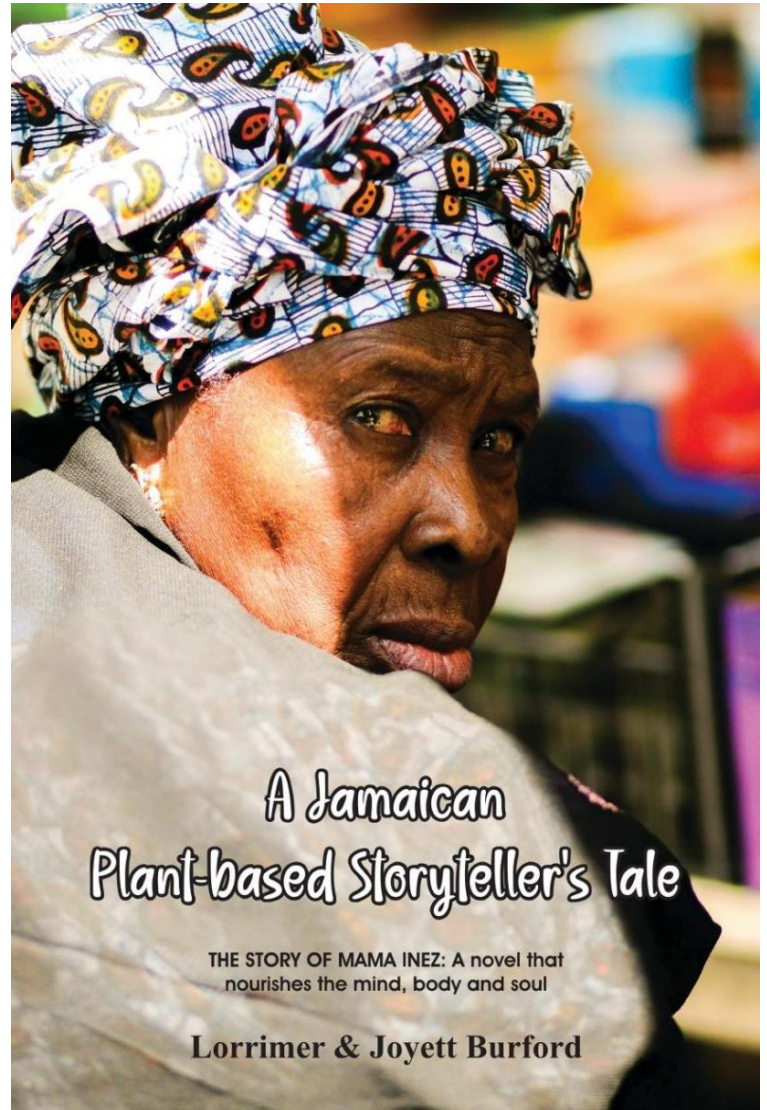

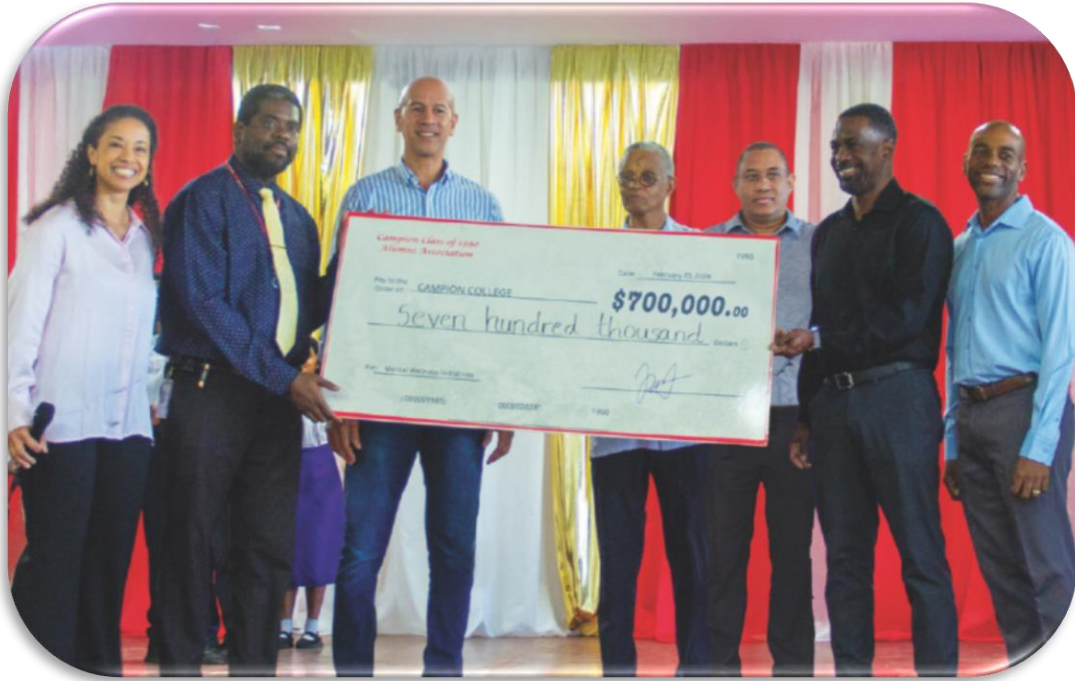

CAMPION'S CLASS OF '90 DONATES \$700,000 TO SCHOOL'S MENTAL WELLNESS INITIATIVES

Campion College Class of 1990 has donated \$700,000 to its alma mater in support of mental wellness initiatives for current students.

The donation, made on the school grounds in Kingston, forms part of a wider effort by the cohort to champion emotional well-being and resilience within the Campion community.

Receiving the cheque on behalf of the school were current Principal, Dr Lavare Henry, PhD, and former principal, board member, dean of studies and master chemistry teacher, Radley Reid. Both expressed deep gratitude to the Class of 1990, noting that the gift reflects a proud tradition of alumni giving back and a shared understanding that student success depends not only on academic excellence but also on emotional support and balance.

The funds will go toward programmes that equip students with practical tools for managing stress, anxiety and the pressures of academic life, as well as initiatives that promote mindfulness, empathy and emotional intelligence.

Dominique Rose, guidance counsellor at the school, welcomed the idea of incorporating new wellness initiatives, stating that such efforts align with Campion's mission to educate the whole person—mind, body and spirit— and to nurture young people who are not only high achievers but compassionate, grounded citizens.

In recent years, the school has been deliberate about broadening its focus beyond academics, building on strong performances in sports and co-curricular activities, and lifting multiple trophies across disciplines. This renewed emphasis on balance reinforces the message that excellence at Campion now means strong grades, vibrant student life and robust well-being.

The donation emerged from a collaborative effort by an organising committee and more than 200 alumni who attended “Back to School”, a special reunion event held in August 2025 in the same courtyard where the Class of 1990 once gathered as teenagers. Music was provided by two alumni who, in addition to their professional careers, are also DJs.

Following the presentation, Master Teacher of Biology and Acting Vice Principal, Kathryn “Katie” Stewart, led the alumni on a tour of the campus. She showcased recent developments and outlined areas where the mental wellness initiatives will have a tangible impact on students’ daily lives.

The alumni also reconnected with familiar spaces, including classrooms, labs and courtyards, while seeing first-hand how the school continues to evolve.

The presentation was made to the entire student body across two assemblies and included an inspiring address by organising committee member, Rita Coore-Widener. She encouraged students to look out for one another, seek help when needed and embrace mental health as a vital part of overall success.

Other representatives of the Class of 1990 shared that the initiative grew from their own reflections on stress, expectations and identity during their school years. Now, as parents, professionals and community members, they felt compelled to help nurture a culture where emotional well-being is valued as highly as academic performance.

CORNWALL COLLEGE GETS MUSIC DONATION

The Cornwall College school band recently received a donation of a drum set from a past student of the Montego Bay institution, and while music teacher Robert Green welcomes the addition, he says they are still some way from having all the pieces they need.

On March 2nd, Albert Spence, a 1989 graduate, handed over the equipment in a brief ceremony at the school's chapel, saying they were hoping to spearhead "a comprehensive revamping of the school's performing arts programme aimed at developing a sustainable cultural environment where creatively inclined students can fully realise their potential".

Spence said, "This initiative will provide structured training, mentorship and performance opportunities across disciplines such as music, drama, dance, and technical production. Our goal is to cultivate excellence, discipline, cultural awareness, and career pathways within the creative industries." While welcoming the gift, Green, himself a past student, said the lack of enough musical instruments for members of the band was holding them back.

"We have students who are very talented, but we are lacking resources...Now that we have a drum

set, this will really push students who can get the chance to practice and better their skills," he said. Green told **Observer Online** that the list of what they did not have was exhaustive.

"So we are currently out of speaker boxes, we have keyboards, but they're like practice keyboards, they are not professional keyboards that the students can be trained, sound wise; we don't have a bass guitar and we would love if we could get a bass amp as well," he said, "We have a guitar, and we have a few wind instruments which we would need some technical assistance with."

Green, who has been at the school in some capacity since February 2025, says not having the proper instruments has held them back in terms of doing public performances.

"For me, I think it would be very much unfair to send out unprepared students to embarrass themselves. So once we get equipment and they're trained and skilled enough, then I'll try to get them into events and also to host events as well." Spence noted that the vision of making the school's band better was not the job of a few.

"As such, we will actively seek the support of our old boys' association and broader alumni network to provide mentorship, funding and industry linkages," Spence said.

"We also intend to pursue strategic partnerships with leading cultural institutions, notably the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts and the Jamaica Cultural Development Commission, as well as collaborate with other institutions to support their cultural endeavours while strengthening our own programme," he added.

ISLAND CAR RENTALS DONATES \$1 MILLION TO TITCHFIELD HIGH SCHOOL DURING NATIONAL ENVIRONMENT WEEK

The cheque presentation happened on March 6, 2026 during a workshop at the school hosted by the National Environment and Planning Agency, NEPA to mark National Environment Week.

The handing over of the cheque was done by Ryan Parkes, Group CEO of ICR Holdings Limited, during the opening segment of the event which NEPA staged under its National Schools Environmental Clubs Programme.

Parkes is a proud alumnus of the institution and testified to the role Titchfield High played in placing him on a successful path in business.

A beaming Parkes said, "this donation by Island Car Rentals is more than a manifestation of corporate responsibility. It's a recognition of the need to sustain an institution that has given much to myself and thousands of other upwardly mobile Jamaicans over the decades."

The workshop brought together approximately 80 students, teachers and environmental club facilitators from schools across Portland and St. Thomas. It served to highlight environmental stewardship, youth engagement and sustainability initiatives in Jamaican schools.

Among the attendees at the event were Minister of Water, Environment and Climate Change, Matthew Samuda, CEO of NEPA, Leonard Francis, Principal of Titchfield High, Richard A Thompson, Opal Brown-Parkes, Group Chief of People and Culture at ICR and Nichole Brackett Walters, Group Chief of Marketing and Sales at ICR.

MANNING'S SCHOOL RECEIVES \$1.15M FROM 2026 NATIONAL LEADERSHIP PRAYER BREAKFAST

THE VM Foundation, in collaboration with the National Leadership Prayer Breakfast (NLPB) Committee, has handed over \$1.15 million to the Manning's School to support the rebuilding of the institution's wellness centre following damage caused by Hurricane Melissa last October. The cheque presentation took place on Monday at the VM Group Corporate Office in Half-Way-Tree, St Andrew.

The funds represent proceeds from the 2026 National Leadership Prayer Breakfast, including a \$500,000 contribution from the VM Foundation, supplemented by offerings and donations from attendees at the event held in January. The investment will support the construction of a new hurricane-resistant, fire- and earthquake-proof

modular sick bay. The upgraded facility will feature a patient examination and resting area, a nurse's workstation and secure storage for medical supplies, strengthening the school's capacity to provide medical support and enhance the physical, mental and emotional well-being of its students.

Chairperson of the NLPB Committee Pastor Claudia Ferguson said the donation reflected the spirit of service and national responsibility that the event seeks to inspire each year.

"This year's event was held against the backdrop of Hurricane Melissa which caused death, devastation and distress particularly in western Jamaica. The former sick bay served as the only

medical facility for student healthcare, first aid and emergency response on the school campus.

“We noted with concern that the absence of such a vital facility could likely pose risks to students and staff alike. We support the concept of a new modular sick bay which will provide physical, mental, emotional and spiritual support to the users, enhance well-being and help to improve student focus, attendance and overall academic achievement,” said Ferguson.

Courtney Campbell, VM group president and CEO, emphasised that the initiative aligns with the organisation’s long-standing commitment to national development and community well-being.

“One special benefit from this ongoing partnership has been the opportunity to impact the beneficiaries of the NLPB. We are in the business of transforming lives and empowering people to achieve well-being, and we are able to do a little more of that each time we partner to support the beneficiaries.

“The Manning’s School has done excellent work in building Jamaica, the Caribbean and the world by virtue of the impact that its graduates have had, so we know that any support provided will be well-received, well-spent and impactful,”

In her response vice-principal of the Manning’s School, Fiona Vassel-Kerr, expressed gratitude for the support, noting that it represents far more than an investment in infrastructure.

“The modular unit that will serve as our new wellness centre symbolises hope, recovery, and speaks well for the shared commitment to the holistic development of our students. The facility will provide a safe and supportive space where students can access wellness support, services that are more important than ever as our school community continues to rebuild and move forward,” said Vassel-Kerr.

The Manning’s School was among the institutions in western Jamaica hardest hit by Hurricane Melissa, which caused widespread disruption and damage across several parishes.

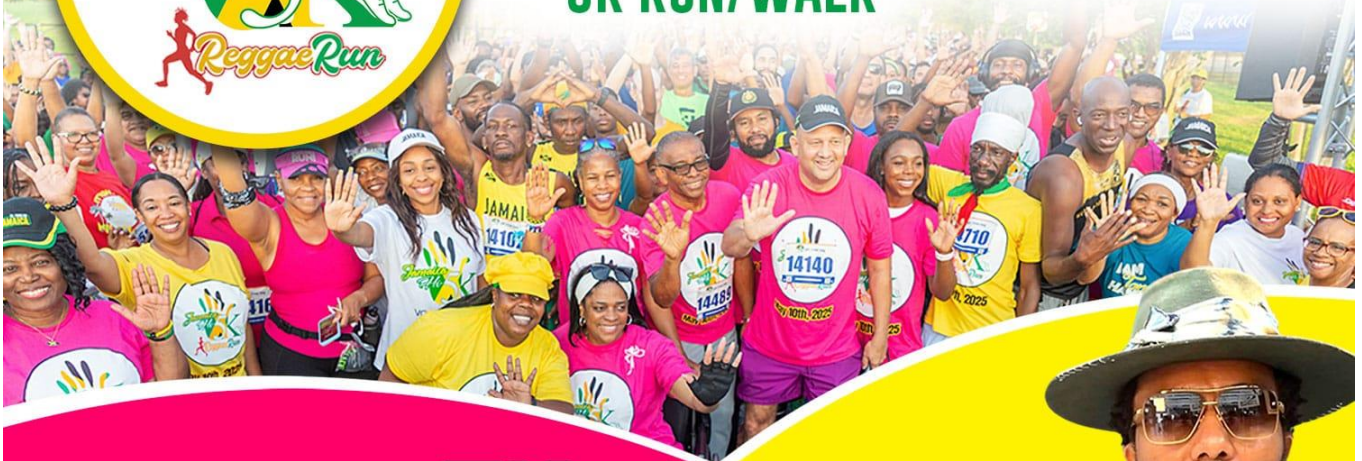
