UWI Mona to Expand Western Jamaica

The University of the West Indies Mona's Western Jamaica campus is to be expanded and upgraded to international standard, Principal of The UWI, Mona Campus, Professor Archibald McDonald has announced.

Principal McDonald made the disclosure during his inaugural speech at his Induction ceremony on October 29. He said it his intention to expand the scope of programmes being offered at The UWI Mona Western Jamaican Campus (WJC) in order to attract more international students to the University.

The new Principal said three properties in Montego Bay which are owned by the Mona Campus along with another property being acquired will be developed to international standards through

partnerships with local and international bodies.

"It is my view that the WJC should be more than just an extension of the Mona Campus", Professor McDonald said. He added that the WJC should provide opportunities to explore new approaches and to develop a range of new programmes that are attractive to local, regional and international students. "My term as Principal will see the UWI significantly increasing its presence in Western Jamaica.

"Professor McDonald is the 13th Principal of The UWI Mona Campus. He succeeds Professor Gordon Shirley who has been seconded to the Port Authority of Jamaica.

Pro-Vice Chancellor and Principal of The University of the West Indies' Cave Hill Campus in Barbados, Sir Hilary Beckles, has been appointed a Special Advisor to United Nations Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon. The UN's top official wrote to Sir Hilary inviting him to be a member of the recently established Scientific Advisory Board which will advise the Secretary General and executive heads of other UN organisations on science, technology and innovation for sustainable development.

"This is a great personal honour indeed and signal recognition for the university," Sir Hilary said of his appointment. "I have worked for many UN organisations over the years, but to be an advisor to the Secretary General, in this new way, on sustainable development is special."

Sir Hilary will join with internationally renowned scientists drawn from the fields of natural, social and human sciences, on the board which has been mandated to "strengthen the linkages between science and policy, and to ensure that the latest scientific findings are reflected in high-level policy discussions within the United Nations systems".

His appointment to the board is for a two-year period with the possibility of renewal for a further two-year term. It comes at a time when he is spearheading a science and technology drive at the campus as it transitions towards becoming a research-oriented university.
