

Recipients of vaccine in Florida must be either a) a resident of Florida or b) an individual present in Florida for the purpose of providing health care services involving direct contact with patients. Residency requirements provide some accommodation of seasonal residents. Individuals who received a first dose before the residency requirement will be able to receive their second dose.

CORNWALL COLLEGE ALUMNI DONATE \$5.8M TO RENOVATE SCIENCE LAB

MONTEGO BAY, St James — A number of local and overseas chapters of the Cornwall College Alumni Association have pooled resources to undertake the renovation of a science laboratory at their alma mater, at a cost of \$5.8 million.

“It's a collaboration amongst various chapters: the Montego Bay chapter, our Florida chapter, the Kingston chapter and old boys were the ones who did all the planning, all the drawings, who are part of the project team, who will be doing the project management. Old boys will be doing the renovation and so it's all in the family. And we have a vested interest to ensure that quality work will be done and that is what will happen,” argued Dr Meghoo, president of the Montego Bay chapter of the Cornwall College Alumni Association.

He was speaking on Tuesday at the signing of the contract between the alumni association and contractors Marken Construction Limited, headed by Richard Downer, a Cornwall College past student, for the project.

Principal of the all-boys' school, Michael Ellis, who “extended commendations” and “profound thanks” to the

past students, noted that the laboratory will go a far way in preparing the students for the science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) curriculum.

“A science lab in this day and age is extremely important. A science lab with 21st-century features is critical to helping us at Cornwall College, to one, deliver what is known as the national standard curriculum which is designed to engage students to provide them with opportunities for project-based learning...those kinds of things. It is very critical that we have a good science lab or I should say good science labs,” Ellis declared.

“It also helps us to a great extent to deliver what we call the STEM curriculum — the science, technology, engineering and mathematical approach to teaching and learning. So a renovated science lab is extremely critical for that purpose.”

“Last but not least, to help our boys to meet international standards as well as to reach the standards where they not just get ones, but good quality ones in their science endeavour. So, my job basically is to ensure that the refurbished science lab serves as the vehicle to continue the rich

tradition, the rich history and culture in science education, not only for our boys to reach standards in Jamaica, but that they will also meet global standards.”

Janet Silvera, director in charge of communication for the South Florida chapter of the alumni, noted that the laboratory will allow the school to continue its rich tradition of providing science education in Jamaica.

“It was the first government school in Jamaica, and also the first high school in the West Indies to offer chemistry and physics as subjects in its curriculum. It also was the high school which had the first chemistry laboratory in Jamaica. This was established in the 1920s, so we are coming from very far,” Silvera noted.

“For many years, the majority of doctors and pharmacists in Jamaica were graduates of the school... that remains true up to today. Many notable scientists, architects, engineers, medical doctors and other science-related fields would have benefited from the high quality of science education at the school over the years.”

Dr Meghoo, who said “I surely benefited from the rich history, the rich educational experience that was afforded here”, pointed out that annually a number of science students matriculate to university from Cornwall College.

“We continue every year to provide multiple students to the faculty of medicine, multiple students to the faculty of engineering, multiple students to the faculty of pure and applied sciences, multiple students to the agricultural field,” he noted.

Meanwhile, the Marken Construction boss promised to complete the renovation work within six months.

“This project would last over the period of six months which I intend to finish far before that. At the end of the six months, that is, at the end of the contract period, I am sure that this chemistry lab will be up and running in that time or maybe before that,” Downer said.

JANICIA SKYERS OF ST HUGH'S FLYING HIGH WITH SPORT OF LACROSSE

AFTER dedicating her entire high school life to the sport of lacrosse at St Hugh's High School for Girls, Janicia Skyers is set this fall to take up both a lacrosse and academic scholarship at Elmhurst University in the United States.

As her athletic and scholastic abilities have helped the 17-year-old secure the award overseas, she plans to study chemistry on her way to becoming a forensic scientist. A balanced school life has helped to ensure that the cost for her tertiary education is covered.

“In total I have nine CXC subjects to my name, including two distinctions. I left high school with an average GPA of 3.6,” Skyers said.

She started St Hugh's in first form and fell in love with lacrosse from then.

“I was following in the shadow of my cousin and I decided that since she was going to leave St Hugh's [before me] I needed to make a name for myself and find myself. Luckily, I found lacrosse in the same time period and it allowed me

to be the person I am today — confident, disciplined, independent, determined and driven for success,” she stated.

Skyers is pleased with the growth of the sport during the time she had been at St Hugh's and believes there is a bright future ahead for the sport and the girls there.

“It has grown tremendously. There are a lot of things that we have now that weren't there when I started playing. We have a great coach and a great set of girls that are still there to carry on the winning streak that I helped to set those years ago,” she noted.

Skyers has had a leadership role in the team for years, something she credits with helping to mold her into the person she is today. She was co-captain from 2015-2017 when St Hugh's won three straight titles, and captain of the 2020 champions. Skyers has helped her school win a total of four titles.

“Honestly, it was one of the greatest positions I could have obtained; it helped me with my time management skills. I

became captain in the final lap of high school so being captain, and having CXC on the other hand, was a lot a work so I had to schedule my time accordingly.

“It helped me with my communication skills. Some of the girls on my team are more sensitive than others so I had to learn their personalities and learn how to get through to them accordingly.

“It helped with enhancing my responsibility levels. I have to think ahead so that if my coach is late or absent, I know that I am in charge of making sure the girls are warmed up and ready for any activity that he throws at us,” she said.

Leadership, Skyers noted, “helped with my mental stability”.

“Being captain...all eyes are on you, so I have to make sure that the energy that I'm bringing to the table is a 120 per cent so that the girls can push the same.

“I have to stay mentally strong for any outcome so, win or lose, when I stay positive throughout my girls also stay positive — and in the end we all go back to the drawing board humble and with pride,” she stated.

Skyers isn't the only member of her team to be offered a lacrosse scholarship and could soon be joined by some of her teammates in the USA.

“Most of our senior girls who are here and recently graduated were all offered scholarships from the schools they applied to, but I'm the first from my high school team to commit to college with a lacrosse and academic scholarship,” she explained.

Skyers gave a ringing endorsement to Jamaica Lacrosse Association (JLA) for exposing children to a completely new experience.

“Even though the national programme is young and still growing I think that it's one of the best programme in Jamaica at the moment. It allows kids to have different dreams and aspirations other than the norms in Jamaica's society.

“It allows phenomenal friendships to be made and a family outside our biological family. The programme allows kids to be themselves while creating a creative and productive safe haven for youths.

“Most of us didn't even know what lacrosse was before JLA introduced it to the high school level, and now [the] majority of us haven't looked back since we started playing. Even though the programme is small and may not be able to meet all the expectations of some viewers, it still has a great impact on youths and definitely makes up for what is lacking — and I wouldn't exchange them for nothing,” Skyers reasoned.

As for her new school, the attacking player is ready to bring it in full force.

“I will bring the impact of my radiant personality, the skills and tricks that I've learnt from friends, both on the field and in the classroom,” said Skyers.

Like so many other high school students, Janicia Skyers has benefited significantly from taking on the challenge of lacrosse.

JAMAICA COLLEGE GAINS STEAM

OLD BOY INJECTS US\$500,000 INTO SCHOOL'S INNOVATIVE PROGRAMME

Jamaica College (JC) has launched its science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics (STEAM) project which seeks to upgrade the school's information communications technology (ICT) infrastructure and teaching methods.

The initiative, funded to the tune of US\$500,000 (approximately J\$73 million) by past student Dr Joseph Lloyd Tait, has seen the upgrade of several classrooms, as well as the retrofitting of three STEAM laboratories that have been equipped with ICT infrastructure and software at the Old Hope Road, St Andrew-based boys' school.

The upgrades include the installation fibre optic cable to facilitate faster Internet, the installation of classroom Internet access points, smart TV's and surround sound audio technology, network surveillance, multimedia projectors, laboratory 3D printer, as well as green screen panels. Principal of JC Wayne Robinson said the upgrades will help to prepare students to function in a working environment driven by technology within the context of a Fourth Industrial Revolution.

“The vision really is to lead our boys into the modern world through how we deliver in all areas of the school. The aim of the STEAM infusion is to engage the boys in a practical and relevant way of learning that includes questioning, answering and solving problems and looking at practical solutions in how we teach.

“Also, it is about how we prepare the boys for the world that they are going to encounter when they go through the gates, and that world is a different world now. We are in the Fourth Industrial Revolution. We're in a world

of 5G, we're in a world of robotics and high technology. But that is not what is being taught and how we are teaching,” Robinson told the **Jamaica Observer** on Tuesday, at the launch of the STEAM initiative at one of three retrofitted labs named after past student and project benefactor, Dr Joseph Lloyd Tait.

“We wanted to change our methodology and that is what we are doing. It is going to take some time. It's going to take maybe another two, or three years to get where we want to go. But we have certainly started the process with first form this year to change the curriculum and how we deliver that curriculum,” added Robinson.

Education Minister Fayval Williams said the STEAM infusion project was in alignment with the Government's thrust to enable student's greater use of, and access to, technology.

“This overall STEAM infusion project is forward-thinking and innovative. If Jamaica is to be the place to live, work, raise families and do business, then our workforce, through our education sector, has to be equally competitive on the global market,” said Williams.

“At the ministry we are committed to the task of ensuring that none of our students is left behind as we seek to

eliminate the digital divide that exists in our society. This divide has been made even more evident with the COVID-19 pandemic and the need for our classrooms to be moved into the virtual space.

“This is one of the best examples of how crucial it is for partnerships to be encouraged in education, as now, because of the outreach of one man and his team, many young men will be able to be inspired in this manner, opening up to them a world of possibilities,” added Williams.

The initiative is being led by the school's systems administrator Dawn McGregor-Bromfield who said the upgraded ICT infrastructure will help to better engage students across all subject areas.

“We have infused STEAM throughout the campus. Every block can feel STEAM. Every subject can use STEAM;

every subject is supported with STEAM infrastructure, products and equipment that have been put in place.

“One of the teachers had a revolutionary idea of making the tables in one of the laboratories ones that the students can write on. We are moving away from telling the students not to write on the table. We have a solution where they can write their workings and solutions on the table,” said McGregor-Bromfield.

She added: “When we went to the manufacturers here in Jamaica with the idea, they said they had never heard of that anywhere. But they said they were going to do it and they did.”
