THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

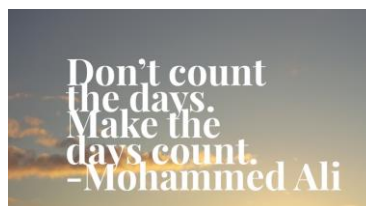
Members of the Florida Chapter:

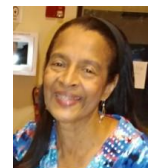

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THIS IS WHY WE NEED TO HELP CURRENT STUDENTS AT OUR ALMA MATER, UWI

On October 3, 2020, the Jamaica Observer reported that at least 1,500 University of the West Indies (UWI), Mona students have applied for leave of absence from their studies because they were either without Internet access or did not have devices to access their courses online last semester.

This was disclosed recently by Sujae Boswell, president of the UWI Guild of Graduates, in an address at the virtual Rotary Club of St Andrew North Education Foundation's grant awards ceremony. According to Boswell, although UWI, Mona had sourced tablets and laptops on behalf of students, a number of them could not afford data charges to be able to access their classes online.

The university was forced to shift classes online because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Boswell said while the Guild Fresh Cash financial aid programme seeks to assist students in need, it is still not enough to meet all the requests.

"We are anticipating that for the upcoming semester there will be deregistration of a number of students, although, in specific cases, the miscellaneous fees have been reduced. However, the tuition fees, quoted in US dollars, remain the same, but the real Jamaican dollar cost has increased, based on the current exchange rate, compared to the J\$135 to US\$1 previously used," said Boswell.

He thanked the Rotary Club of St Andrew North Education Foundation for assisting seven students for the upcoming semester, to the tune of \$235,000. The students attend the UWI; Jamaica College; St Andrew High School for Girls; Merl Grove High School; Ardenne High School; The Queen's School; and Calabar High School. Each student will receive a grant to cover lunch, transportation, or school fees, depending on the need that was identified. Donald Patterson, director of the foundation, announced during the virtual awards ceremony that since its incorporation 24 years ago, about 100 students have received grant assistance from funds earned on investments, or through fund-raising efforts by the Rotary Club of St Andrew North Foundation.

Boswell, meanwhile, encouraged the club to go beyond the financial support provided by the foundation to that of social assistance to both students and parents who are undergoing challenges because of the pandemic.

"We have been seeing an increase in the mental issues among young people during this COVID-19 period because, with students being home, a number of them are getting depressed and stressed arising from their environment, lack of equipment and online access that they need to continue their education. This is primarily because their parents cannot afford to assist them," said Boswell.

UWI GRAD ELECTED MAYOR



UWI Alumna, was elected mayor of the city of New Carrollton in Maryland in June 2020. She is the first female and first person of colour to be elevated to that position.

She graduated with a degree in management and accounting from **The UWI** and in 1996, she was recognised as Student of the Year at UWI. Then migrated to the United States. She worked with Sun Trust Bank and then went to Presidential Bank, as a regional manager. She has always seen herself as a community activist rather than a politician.

Since taking the reins at city hall, Nembhard she has already instituted a number of reforms and is working with the city's police department to effect reforms. Her agenda is progressive, with priorities including the improvement of the city's infrastructure and solvency, as well as the improvement of the quality of life for all residents.

In terms of policing, Mayor Nembhard notes that the police department will institute a community resource officer programme where officers out of uniform integrate with the community. Additionally, some resources will be reallocated from the police department so that people trained in mental health can work with the police to help with social interventions.

She is the youngest person to serve as New Carrollton's mayor, a city with about 60 per cent blacks. She is looking forward to serving at a higher level and to making a positive difference.

UWI SCIENTIST, PROFESSOR JOHN AGARD APPOINTED BY UN SECRETARY-GENERAL

Professor John Agard appointed to co-chair 2023 Global Sustainable Development Report team



Professor John Agard, a leading scientist from the Department of Life Sciences at The University of the West Indies, St. Augustine Campus has been appointed by UN Secretary-General, António Guterres to help draft the [2023 Global Sustainable Development Report](#).

Professor Agard joins a diverse group of 15 independent scientists around the world, representing a wide range of disciplines, expertise, and backgrounds, who will work as a team on preparing the report. He is the only scientist from the Caribbean region and will co-chair this group of eminent scholars.

According to a statement from the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs, “The Report will provide guidance on the state of global sustainable development from a scientific perspective, address new and emerging issues and challenges, and offer recommendations for action by governments and other actors.” It is the second such group and report, as mandated by United Nations Member States.

The first group released its report, entitled *The Future is Now: Science for Achieving Sustainable Development*, in September of 2019. The COVID-19 pandemic has since emerged, threatening decades of development progress. The next report will be developed in this context and will be published in 2023, then in September of that year, inform the high-level, global review of the implementation of the 2030 Agenda. The team will conduct its work from October 2020 until then coordinating inputs from existing networks, representing the United Nations, the private sector, civil society, and academia groups.

At the international level, Professor Agard has served on a number of global working groups. He has been a Lead Author of the UN Inter-Governmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) 4th and 5th Assessments and a Review Editor on the 6th Assessment Report. He also served as the Coordinating Lead Author on the Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES). Professor Agard serves as independent advisor on environment and sustainability policy to the Board of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) in Washington, DC; he has previously served as a member of the CARICOM Climate Change Task Force and as a member of the Caribbean Sea Commission formed by the Association of Caribbean States (ACS) to advance the cause of integrated management of the Caribbean Sea.

Professor of Tropical Island Ecology, Agard was Head of the Department of Life Sciences at The UWI St. Augustine Campus for six years. He is currently Director of The UWI St Augustine Centre for Innovation and Entrepreneurship. His qualifications include a B.Sc. and Ph.D. from The UWI and a Master of Science in Pollution and Environmental Control from the University of Manchester.

MICHAEL G. SALMON, M.SC. NAMED ASSISTANT VICE PRESIDENT/DEAN OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AND SENIOR ADVISOR TO THE PRESIDENT



In a letter to the Marymount Manhattan College (MMC) in New York, the president of the institution Dr. Kerry Walk, wrote the following:

*I am thrilled to announce the appointment of **Michael G. Salmon, M.Sc. as Assistant Vice President/Dean of Academic Excellence and Senior Advisor to the President.** In this new position, Michael will advise me on the strategic direction of the College; serve as Ambassador to a wide variety of internal and external constituencies; and partner with the leadership of Academic Affairs, Student Success & Engagement, and Institutional Advancement to move initiatives forward that are of vital importance to MMC's future. Many of these initiatives are close to Michael's heart, such as programs in parent/family engagement,*

alumni outreach, student recruitment, student success, and faculty and staff development. He will also continue to teach Economics, a field in which his specializations include cross-country business cycle transmissions, Caribbean Basin economics, and applied microeconomics theory.

Dean Salmon, as he is affectionately known, is among the most highly regarded members of the MMC community; he is also among the most popular, having even “gone viral” with this year’s new and transfer students after an inspirational speech he gave. Indeed, *inspiration* is what Michael has brought to MMC students, faculty, staff, families, and alumni for over two and a half decades, having joined our college community in 1993 as a part-time Economics professor. He is a person who truly knows how to inspire people to action.

During his distinguished career at MMC, Dean Salmon has served in a variety of roles under three presidents at MMC, most recently as Assistant Vice President and Dean of the Center for Academic Excellence, with oversight of Academic Advisement, MMC’s Higher Education Opportunity Program (HEOP), and the Center for Academic Support & Tutoring (CAST).

Dean Salmon completed his undergraduate and graduate studies at the University of the West Indies and was mentored by some of the most highly regarded scholars in economics. He notes that while he was enrolled at The UWI Mona, he met world-renowned economist, Dr. George Beckford, a leading scholar of plantation economics, who became his mentor and inspired him to reach higher, even offering Salmon, at this point a young man of great promise, his first teaching position with the University. The positive impact of Dr. Beckford’s mentorship changed Salmon’s life.

In 1993, he joined MMC as an Economics instructor and even with his administrative duties, he continues to teach one course each semester to this day. At MMC, it did not take very long for Prof. Salmon to make the transition to Dean Salmon, an advisor who became the leader of the Office of Academic Advisement for nearly two decades. He worked tirelessly and enthusiastically to build Academic Advisement into the trusted and caring office it is today.

For his outstanding role as an administrator, Dean Salmon was awarded the College’s annual **Outstanding Administrator Award** a record-breaking four times. On a national level, he is the recipient of the **Outstanding First-Year Student Advocate Award** from The National Resource Center for The First-Year Experience and Students in Transition, which recognizes and rewards individuals who are involved in high-impact practices for first-year student success. Dean Salmon will now be using the lessons and experience garnered over a lifetime to reach an even wider circle of MMC students, alumni, families, and friends in his new role.
